From the Principal

GLADSTONE

I recently visited a Year 10 PDE class and one of the topics that they are learning about is gratitude. I have been thinking a lot about "being grateful" of late and have been trying to include "things that I am grateful for" as part of my nightly prayer routine. A very wise man once told me that counting blessings is a much more effective way of preparing to go to sleep than counting sheep!

I recently came across this article and I thought that I would share it with you.

Teaching our children to say "thank you" is important, but truly instilling a sense of gratitude in them is another matter entirely. Gratitude goes beyond good manners - it's a mindset and a lifestyle.

Studies show that children who count their blessings reap concrete benefits, including greater life satisfaction and a better attitude about school.

Why is it important to cultivate an attitude of gratitude?

First of all, gratitude is healthy for us, adults and children alike. Cultivating gratitude increases happiness levels. Gratitude can also help individuals live happier, more satisfied lives and enjoy increased levels of self-esteem, hope, empathy and optimism. Children who practise grateful thinking have more positive attitudes toward school and family.

Gratitude gives perspective. When you take into account the sheer number of opportunities, privileges and material possessions most children enjoy through no effort of their own, it's easy to see why many of them feel entitled. After all, they get used to getting stuff without knowing or caring where it comes from. Practising gratitude, on the other hand, underscores the fact that all those toys and creature comforts don't just pop out of thin air. When children recognise that the things they own and the opportunities they have come from someone other than themselves, it helps them develop a healthy understanding of how interdependent we all are. Then they may be more inclined to treat others with genuine respect.

Gratitude improves relationships. Would you rather show up at work every day to colleagues who freely acknowledge and appreciate your contributions, or colleagues who take your efforts for granted with a perfunctory grunt of thanks? It's a simple principle: gratitude fosters stronger, more positive and more genuine relationships.

Gratitude counteracts the 'gimmes'. Fundamentally, gratitude is about being aware of who or what makes positive aspects of our lives possible, and acknowledging that. When children learn to think in those terms, they can be less apt to make mindless, self-centred demands. Plus, they begin to appreciate what they have rather than focusing on what they wish they had.

On a sunny May 13, the Year 11 Chemistry class visited the Gladstone Water Treatment Plant, providing a clear visual depiction of their current syllabus about water. They were fortunate to be guided by the Superintendent In-charge, Sara, who gave a tour around the site according to its procedural orders. First of all, we were invited to a conference room, where Sara delivered a talk about the general process and aim of water treating, before proceeding to observation sites. Each step of water



treatment is complex and supervised from the control room, where the students were given special privilege to access. Students were exposed to the coagulation and flocculation systems, filtration, DAFF (Dissolved Air



Filtration Flotation) sites and fluoridisation. Our Year 11 Chemistry students have expanded their perspectives on water from this excursion and developed a better appreciation for the water they consume every day.

Dear Parents and Carers

This letter has been sent to **all** parents and carers of students in our school to inform them of our participation in the 2014 data collection.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on Students with Disability

Our school has been selected to participate in the 2014 Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability.

What is the National Collection of Data on School Students with Disability?

All Australian governments have agreed to work together to implement a new annual national data collection on school students with disability. This data collection process is being phased in over a three year period from 2013-2015. The first two years will be a transition period. This means that all schools will begin preparing for participating in the collection from 2013.

In 2015, the first full national collection of data on school students with disability will take place in all Australian schools. From then on, this data collection will occur in every school, every year, along with other school data collections.

What does disability mean?

This new national data collection will reinforce the actions required of schools under the National Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005. The significant change with this collection is the use of a broader definition of disability than the one currently used to identify and allocate resources in educational systems. As a result of this shift in the definition we believe that more students in our community may be considered eligible for identification in the data collection. These laws mean that schools and education systems are required to make, where needed, reasonable adjustments for students with disability.

What is an adjustment?

An adjustment is a measure or action taken to assist a student with disability to participate in education on the same basis as other students. Adjustments can be made across the whole school setting, in the classroom and at the individual level. Some students with disability, at particular stages during their time at school, may not require any personalised adjustments beyond the differentiation that teachers provide to all students on a day-to-day basis. Differentiation occurs when teachers usea variety of teaching strategies to cater for reasonable adjustments for students with disability. Differentiation is not the same as personalised adjustments made for individual students. Differentiation is part of good teaching practice.

What will this mean for my child?

Determining the level and type of support needed for an individual student is not a new activity for Australian schools. The information provided by this new data collection will enable all Australian governments to better target support and resources to assist students with disability in both government and non government schools. More accurate information about school students with disability will assist teachers, principals and education authorities to support access and participation in schooling for students with disability on the same basis as students without disability.

What information will be collected?

In 2014 the data will be collected on 1 August 2014 and will include:

- Total number of school students
- Number of students with disability by school level enrolment (primary/secondary)

- Number of students within disability type (physical, social/emotional, cognitive or sensory)
- Level of adjustment provided (none, supplementary, substantial or extensive)

Information will be recorded in such a way to be sure that no child can be identified. **Student names** will not be collected by the Diocesan Catholic Education Office.
