

On Wednesday in the last week of Term 3,
7 students (Hugh, Annaliese, Kelsey,
Jacques, Natalie, Brittany and Tom) and 2
teachers (Miss Derepas and Mr Davis) embarked
from Gladstone Airport with Mrs Mills and Mr O'Mara.

After a long trip of around 30 hours from Gladstone to Dili, the capital of East Timor, the eleven travellers hopped on a bus. It was a slow 4-hour bus ride on a winding coastal road (not that it is much of a road) with no seatbelts and the door wide open. We courageous students wanted to hang out the door or even sit on the roof – just like the East Timorese - but the wise words of the teachers prevented such activities. The bus ride took us to Baucau, a district capital in East Timor. As we hit Baucau, the lifestyle of the

East Timorese hit us. Houses made of bamboo and thatch. Meals consisting largely of rice and vegetables and rarely meat.

The next day, when we arrived in Baguia, and the lifestyle back home seemed like luxury. The people of Baguia do not have running water or a reliable source of electricity. To have showers, they use a scoop of water, no larger than a litre. To get this water they have to walk to a spring which could be just down the hill or halfway up the mountainside, depending on where they live. At the best of times, the water from the spring is a slow trickle. At the worst, the water may not be running at all due to the dry season, as we experienced on our last day in Baguia.

Sleeping under mosquito nets and a roof that would be prone to leak during the wet season, we were still in one of the most luxurious houses in the Baguia subdistrict, as we had stone walls and a corrugated iron roof. Most East Timorese have bamboo walls and a thatch roof.

School in Baguia is extremely different to school at Chanel. Chalkboards are the extent of an East Timorese school's technology. As part of the immersion experience, all members of the group taught English to the students at St











Joseph's School. An unfortunate vomiting bug meant that on the first day we were meant to teach only seven of us taught.

Six of us taught classes of 30-40 students, with Mrs Mills running from class to class as a translator and teaching guide. The first thing that struck all six of us was the student's desire to learn. Many students walked great distances in order to get to school. Some students from Rufagia, the village in the mountainside above Baguia, had a two-hour walk down and up the mountain to and from school. Even though this meant that some children were up at 5.00 am to get to school on time, they still came to class and were eager and active students in the lessons. In the following days, as the members of the group recovered and joined in the teaching, we formed an unwavering bond with our students.

As you can probably tell, life in Baguia is very different to life in Gladstone. But there are also some surprising similarities. Just like in Gladstone, East Timorese teens are hooked on mobile phones and social media like Facebook, due to the ridiculously cheap prices of phones and texting (each text costs something like 0.0007 cents). The teens in Baguia are also very into their sport. Most afternoons, our group found ourselves in a heated volleyball or soccer match against the East Timorese. This was because we often went down to the orphanage to spend time with the under-privileged kids.

One the most inspirational people we have ever met is Leopoldina Guterres. Leo is the co-ordinator of eight Catholic schools in the Baguian subdistrict. She is very passionate about young people and has around 15 children who she has accepted into her house, either because they have no other place to stay or because they live so far away from a school that they cannot practically get an education. Leo does all of this off her own income and receives no government support.

It was Leo who came with us when we attended Aelita School. Aelita School has been supported by Chanel's Marcellin House, which is allowing it to grow into a practical place of education. The people of Aelita have almost completed building much needed classrooms that will benefit the many students who attend Aelita School.

During our time there, our eyes were opened to the painful history of East Timor. The nation has

experienced extreme hardship in their history, from the colonisation by the Portuguese, the introduction of Australian troops in WWII, to the despicable invasion of the Indonesians in 1975. The occupation of East Timor by Indonesia lasted for 24 years and was the reason for multiple massacres, the mistreatment of the East Timorese people, warfare and starvation that resulted in the death of one third of the East Timorese

population. The scars of this 24 year occupation are still seen today, where even in the capital, Dili, there are burnt shells of buildings, from the Indonesians setting fires all over the country. Even today, East Timor is being taken advantage of. To our shame, the Australian Government has unlawfully extended the maritime boundaries of the North Australian waters so that they can access oil that is rightfully East Timor's.

Even through these hardships, the people of East Timor are the most beautiful people who you will ever meet. They have nothing and yet they have endless happiness and love for one another. While this report is massive, we have only scratched the surface of our immersion in East Timor. We would like to thank Mrs Mills and Mr O'Mara, our fearless leaders, for their endless knowledge of East Timorese culture and their support: both for the students and for the East Timorese people.
