From the Principal

Welcome back to Term 3. I hope that all students and staff had an enjoyable holiday and are looking forward to the challenges of Semester 2!

Congratulations to our Confraternity and QISSN teams who competed at the Gold Coast during the first week of the holidays. It was a great week and I was proud of the way that they conducted themselves on the courts and fields. It was a joy to watch! Thank you to Mr Davis, Miss Kickbusch, Miss Beveridge, Mr Rawnsley and Mr Poole for their commitment to these teams and for giving up a week of the holidays in order to allow our students to have this experience.

Yesterday our community participated in a very special NAIDOC Week Liturgy prepared by Ms Caroline Geesu. NAIDOC Week celebrations are held across Australia each July to celebrate the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. The theme for NAIDOC Week 2014 is **Serving Country: Centenary & Beyond**. This theme honours all Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men and women who have fought in defence of country. From the warriors in the Frontier Wars to the warriors who have served with honour and pride in Australia's military conflicts and engagements across the globe. It is important to highlight and recognise the role they have played in shaping our identity and pause to reflect on their sacrifice. We celebrate and honour their priceless contribution to our nation. Thank you to the students who presented in the liturgy.

I have just returned from the Australian Catholic Secondary Principals' Conference in Darwin. Approximately 300 Principals from all over Australia and New Zealand gathered to explore the question "Who is my Neighbour?". I was privileged to attend a session by Miriam Rose Ungunmerr-Baumann, a remarkable Indigenous woman from the Daly River. I have long been aware of Miriam's work as an artist, but it was inspiring to hear about her journey as a Principal and what she has been trying to achieve for the Indigenous youth. She challenged us with the question "How can I nourish my spirit?" and shared with us a beautiful reflection. I sat and listened to her mesmerised, the quietness of her voice urging me to slow down and be in the moment. I didn't take any notes, I just listened and tried to connect with what she was saying. This morning, I "googled" her and found one her reflections. I would like to share an extract from this reflection with you.

Our Aboriginal culture has taught us to be still and to wait. We do not try to hurry things up. We let them follow their natural course - like the seasons. We watch the moon in each of its phases. We wait for the rain to fill our rivers and water the thirsty earth...

When twilight comes, we prepare for the night. At dawn we rise with the sun. We watch the bush foods and wait for them to ripen before we gather them. We wait for our young people as they grow, stage by stage, through their initiation ceremonies. When a relation dies, we wait a long time with the sorrow. We own our grief and allow it to heal slowly. We wait for the right time for our ceremonies and our meetings. The right people must be present.

Everything must be done in the proper way. Careful preparations must be made. We don't mind waiting, because we want things to be done with care. Sometimes many hours will be spent on painting the body before an important ceremony. We don't like to hurry. There is nothing more important than what we are attending to. There is nothing more urgent that we must hurry away for. We wait on God, too. His time is the right time. We wait for him to make his Word clear to us. We don't worry. We know that in time and in the spirit of dadirri (that deep listening and quiet stillness) His way will be clear.

We are River people. We cannot hurry the river. We have to move with its current and understand its ways. There are deep springs within each of us. Within this deep spring, which is the very Spirit of God, is a sound. The sound of Deep calling to Deep. The sound is the word of God - Jesus.

PARENT *Self Care*

I read once that as parents we can “only give from overflow” and yet parents often run on empty. Research (Australian Institute of Family Studies, 2010) shows that parental involvement in late childhood and beyond is “very much needed to provide a secure base and emotional and physical support.”

How can we take care of ourselves so that we have the stamina to nurture our children right through adolescence? Michael Grose suggests a number

of practical and manageable ways for parents to look after themselves.

Take mini-breaks

Letting our children know that we need some time out is great modelling for them. Going up to your room for 15 minutes, turning on some relaxing music and breathing slowly and deeply a few times a week helps you and them. Having time alone with a spouse or friend on a regular basis also helps. Make a regular time for this and organise a baby sitter.

Have a laugh

Humour is a great way to relax. Watch a funny movie, socialise with positive people (both positivity and negativity can be contagious). See the funny side to some of the things your kids do and say. Laughter boosts the immune system and helps speed recovery from illness so make it a habit.

Share the load

If we do all the work around the house how can our children learn to be independent? Start expecting children to do age appropriate chores on a regular basis so when they leave home they know how to take care of themselves and they won't feel the need to return home with their weekly laundry! Accept that both parents have a role in disciplining and share follow up of consequences between you.

Ease the pressure

Children cannot be perfect - they are learning as they go. Their definition of tidy may be different to yours but if you can close their bedroom door it can improve relationships and save you lots of energy spent on nagging. Parents are learning as they go too so try to be “a good enough parent” rather than a perfect parent. We all make mistakes and over react at times but if necessary apologise and move on. Try to recall one positive interaction you had with your child each night before you go to sleep.

The 2014 Qld Independent Schools Confraternity Rugby League Carnival was hosted by St Thomas Aquinas College on the Gold Coast. The Chanel College first XIII, a team of 20 players, committed the first half of their school holidays to playing 6 gruelling games over 4 days, often playing whilst injured.

The team performed extremely well by winning 4 of their 6 games and narrowly missing out on a grand final spot. Whilst representing the mighty Chanel College, the boys earned respect both on and off the field by their maturity and sportsmanship. They were gracious in defeat, keen to support the Netball girls whilst playing in their finals and consistently displayed respectful behaviour on their own time.

The Chanel team won 4 of the 6 games (losing game 1 to Shalom and with 30 seconds to go, losing to St Columban's which cost us the silverware of the Confraternity Bowl). Josh Hughes was awarded player of the Carnival for the Chanel team.

Josh scored 3 tries himself (and set up 6 others) and played with a broken wrist during game 6, a true Chanel warrior. 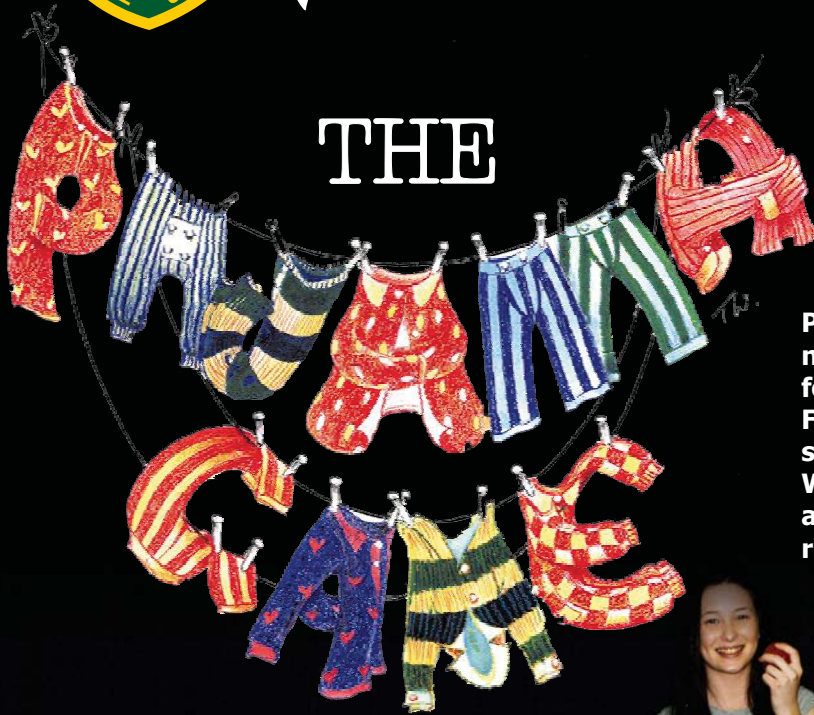
