Congratulations to Mrs Kym Williams and Mrs Sue Miles for 20 years of service and Mr Mark Davis for 25 years of service.

I also had the privilege of announcing the 2016 Chanel Person of the Year — Sr Beryl Amedee. Sr Beryl has had a very long association with Chanel and is a greatly loved member of our community. She joined the Chanel Staff in 1970 and taught here in 1971, 1973 and 1974. As a teacher of English and Religious Education, she was very passionate about her students. Sr Beryl particularly loved attending Chanel College student and staff retreats.

After leaving Chanel Sr Beryl's association continued in her role as Diocesan Co-ordinator of Religious Education where she worked with teachers and pupils of primary and secondary schools.

In 2004 Sr Beryl returned to Gladstone to live and once again connected with Chanel, living in the Mercy Sisters Convent in Morley Street. She was often invited into Religious Education lessons to share her expertise on various topics, particular during Vocations Week. She was a regular visitor to Year 8 classes where she would share her knowledge about Catherine McAuley.

Sr Beryl also generously gave her time to mentor young staff and was always willing to sit with them and help them in their Religious Education lesson planning. She was also an active member of the Staff Spirituality Committee.

Sr Beryl was the leader of the organising committee for the Chanel College 40th anniversary celebrations that were held in 2006.

Despite not formally teaching classes she was considered as an honorary staff member until 2014 where she answered the call to another role away from Gladstone.

Sr Beryl is a member of the Sisters of Mercy congregation and the gift of her presence has been a constant reminder of our Mercy charism. Like Catherine McAuley she has been a visionary and has demonstrated Catherine McAuley's traits of hard work, resilience and an unwavering faith in God that is inspirational and reflects her commitment to her vocation.

Chanel College is a richer place due to the contributions of Sr Beryl. She has always demonstrated a great affection for Chanel. Her contributions have had far outreaching impacts from students to parents to staff, especially her support to families beyond their time at Chanel.

As we Bless and Open Stage 1 of our Master Plan it is timely for us to remember foundations. I recently came across an account by Sister Mary Sylvester, RSM. the Foundation Principal to tell the story in her own words of

beginnings...

"Black and miserable was that day in January, 1966, when the nucleus of what was to be the Gladstone Catholic High School huddled into two verandahs of the "Star of the Sea" School.

Fr Busby, acting Parish Priest, was, to use a hackneyed expression,
"on the horns of a dilemma". Owing to an influx of primary pupils
- the Alumina boom had started - there was no accommodation
- the Alumina boom had started remarkable in the Primary School for the new Year 8.

Difficulties were made to be overcome. Soon Year 8 - all thirty three of them - were fitted in, more or less like sardines in a tin, under the Presbytery. Pitting desks in without colliding with supporting timber was an achievement in itself. The novelty of new books and new work was an incentive.

A fortnight later, the new school was transferred to a two-room cottage two paddocks down from the Primary School. It leaving thirty-seven looked respectable enough, but leaving thirty-seven teenagers (four Americans later joined the group) teenagers (four Americans later joined the group) alone for any length of time would be courting

The clergy, Sister Francesa and other Sisters at the Convent and the parents gave their full support.

Dear Parents and Carers

This letter has been sent to all parents and carers of students in our school to inform them of our participation in the 2016 data collection.

Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on Students with Disability

All schools in Australia are required to participate in the 2016 Nationally Consistent Collection of Data on School Students with Disability.

What is the National Collection of Data on School Students with Disability?

All Australian governments have agreed to work together to implement a new annual national data collection on school students with disability. This data collection process is being phased in over a three year period from 2013-2015. The first two years were a transition period.

In 2015, the first full national collection of data on school students with disability occurred in all Australian schools. From then on, this data collection will occur in every school, every year, along with other school data collections.

What does disability mean?

This national data collection will reinforce the actions required of schools under the National Disability Discrimination Act 1992 and the Disability Standards for Education 2005. The significant change with this collection is the use of a broader definition of disability than the one currently used to identify and allocate resources in educational systems. As a result of this shift in the definition we believe that more students in our community may be considered eligible for identification in the data collection. These laws mean that schools and education systems are required to make, where needed, reasonable adjustments for students with disability.

What is an adjustment?

An adjustment is a measure or action taken to assist a student with disability to participate in education on the same basis as other students. Adjustments can be made across the whole school setting, in the classroom and at the individual level. Some students with disability, at particular stages during their time at school, may not require any personalised adjustments beyond the differentiation that teachers provide to all students on a day-to-day basis. Differentiation occurs when teachers use a variety of teaching strategies to cater for reasonable adjustments for students with disability. Differentiation is not the same as personalised adjustments made for individual students. Differentiation is part of good teaching practice.

What will this mean for my child?

Determining the level and type of support needed for an individual student is not a new activity for Australian schools. The information provided by this new data collection will enable all Australian governments to better target support and resources to assist students with disability in both government and non-government schools. More accurate information about school students with disability will assist teachers, principals and education authorities to support access and participation in schooling for students with disability on the same basis as students without disability.

What information will be collected?

In 2016 the data will be collected by Friday 5 August and will include:

- Total number of school students
- Number of students with disability by school level enrolment (primary/secondary)
- Number of students within disability type (physical, social/emotional, cognitive or sensory)
- Level of adjustment provided (Support provided within quality differentiated teaching practice, supplementary, substantial or extensive)

Information will be recorded in such a way to be sure that no child can be identified. **Student names will not be collected by the Diocesan Catholic Education Office.**
