### •• Top ten tips for parents of teenagers



**1. Be the kind of adult you want your kids to become.** Actively decide to lead by example. Really think about what you do and say (and how you say it) every day.

2. Save your energy for important issues. Try to avoid knee-jerk or instinctive reactions, especially if you often disagree. Rather than react immediately, pause to think about whether the issue is important in the long term, and about other ways to respond.

**3. Remember their brains are easily switched to 'high alert'.** Avoid triggering your teenager's automatic 'fight or flight' response when you want to talk to them. Ask them if it's a good time to talk; sit down; use a calm, gentle voice; find out more about their feelings.

**4. Timing is everything.** Only talk about problem issues when everyone's calm and relaxed, not busy, stressed or in a hurry. Schedule a meeting, and agree beforehand that as a family, you will calmly explore issues so you can all get along better.

**5. Learn a new language.** Break the habit of speaking to your teenager as you did when they were younger. Try chatting with them more like you would with a work colleague or acquaintance. Share ideas, offer choices, negotiate; value their contribution.

6. Teach risk-evaluation skills. Prompt your teenager to think about potentially risky situations ahead of time, and to consider the likely outcomes of various choices. Rather than lay down the law, ask 'what if...' questions and help them to come up with possible options and action plans.

7. Stay in touch. Have regular positive conversations about day-to-day activities so you know what your teenager is doing, and keep up to date with new technology. Ask them to show you what they're interested in and how it works.

8. Involve them in making decisions. Allow for change as they become older. Help them take on new responsibilities. Be flexible and let them have a say wherever possible. Hold family meetings so they can contribute ideas and have their opinions heard and valued.

**9. Turn the 'need for novelty' and peer group acceptance into a positive.** Help your teenager find supervised group activities they enjoy. Regular activity – even if it's not sport – and good eating and sleep patterns are vital for physical and mental health. Limit screen time appropriately.

**10. Be a safe sounding board.** Teenagers' emotions are often intense, and they're struggling to find their place in the world. Encourage them to discuss new ideas and values at home, without rejection or ridicule. Help them figure out problems and possibilities.

### Spinning Yarn with Year 9 History

The Textile Industry was changed significantly during the Industrial Revolution in Europe during the 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup> Centuries. 

### Stor Medal for the 2018 Chanel College QISSN Netball Team

What an amazing result from the nine Chanel QISSN girls a Silver medal to finish 2<sup>nd</sup> in Division 3 and 18<sup>th</sup> overall out of 64 schools. This is not only the best result ever by a Chanel team, but the first time a Chanel QISSN team has taken home a medal from the Carnival. Congratulations to the 2018 QISSN team!

Townsville was the host venue for this year's QISSN carnival and it proved to be a very happy hunting ground for the team. Flying in early on the Saturday, the team soaked up the sights of Townsville and al the players were fresh and ready to take on the competition. At the Opening Ceremony on the Sunday, former Australian Diamonds player Sharon Finnan addressed the players and challenged them to strive and play beyond what is expected and to push the boundaries of their abilities. I think this message was well and truly taken in by the Chanel girls as they started with a bang on Day 1.

Three players made their QISSN debut (Rykiah Woolley, Bojana Bijelic and Alisha Verner) on Day 1, but you would not have known, as they blew their opposition (St Ursula's Toowoomba and St Michael's Merrimac) off the court. The zone defence and hands up pressure over every pass, caused frustration for the opposing teams and led to turn-over and after turn-over being won by the Chanel team. This defence pressure would be the trademark of the team and something other teams tried to replicate, but could not sustain. The crisp passing through the midcourt (from Imogen, Bojana, Alisha, Rykiah and Alexa) was

We were down to seven players for the remainder of Day 2. This served as a driving force for the girls to get out on court and show what they were made of. The last game of Day 2, and probably the game that turned the mindset and desire of the team, was a hard fought and very tight draw against Mount Alvernia College. It was end to end netball, with no lead ever bigger than 1 goal throughout the entire game. The girls held their nerve



fantastically for the game, having to make the last shot of the game to get the draw. They did not like the feeling of not getting the win, and this drove them to perform even better in the coming days. Grace Graham even got interviewed after the game (for the live stream of the QISSN Carnival). She answered the questions superbly and showed true leadership qualities.

Day 3 is traditionally a rest day, but with the increase in the number of teams to 64, the QISSN teams now do not have the luxury of a day of rest. So this was the last of the pool games, and to give ourselves the best opportunity to make the finals the team needed to finish in the Top four of Pool C. The nerve and stamina of the team would be tested, with only eight players for the remainder of the competition and the prospect of a top four finish on the cards. Well did the girls come out firing or what? After an inspirational pep-talk from Captain Grace Graham, the girls again frustrated their opposition with their defence.

It was the work of the mid-court and shooters that really stood up in these games. The player combinations were on fire and the ball speed was way too much for our opposition to handle. A six goal win against St Peter Claver College set up a must-win game against St Luke's Anglican School to finish in the top two of the pool. The Confraternity boys were on hand to support the team for this game, and the extra support spurred the girls on to put in a stellar performance and finish the pool games with a win and  $2^{nd}$  in Pool C. This would ensure that the girls could win their way into the gold medal match for Division 3.

The Quarter Final game was against Canterbury College which finished 3<sup>rd</sup> in Pool D, the winner would progress to the major Semi-Final for a spot in the Grand Final. The girls were up for the challenge and determined to prove to themselves that they could win and make the Grand Final. After a shaky start, being down by three at half time, we set the challenge to the team- 'if you really want to win this game, then show us you want it out on that court'! They responded in true form – pulling off intercepts and rebounds, causing held balls from

their opposition, transitioning from defence to attack with lightning speed and treasuring possession when they had the ball. These key areas proved to be too much for Canterbury College which crumbled under the pressure – the girls got the win 19-16 and moved into the major Semi-Final.

Their opponents would be the very first team they played, St Ursula's Toowoomba. Even though they had improved results, the Chanel girls would not let them or any other team

From the get-go the girls stepped out onto court and put on display the true Chanel spirit, backing each other up in defence, pulling off amazing intercepts, and transitioning down the court with accuracy of passes and shots. Shalom College stepped up the defensive pressure which caused the Chanel girls to turn over ball, they were starting to look rattled and half time could not come soon enough. Your coaching tips, encouraging words of wisdom, giving up a week of your school holidays to come away with the team and support of the team was greatly appreciated.


