Along with twenty other Queensland STEM students, I attended a three-day camp as a QMEA Ambassador for 2017 during the first week of the school holidays. Having travelled a collective 14,000 km to Brisbane, the diverse

range of Ambassadors in our team exposed me to the amazing variety of pathways you can take to achieve any job in the natural resources sector. While on camp we were mentored by industry representatives in training activities and skills workshops, visiting facilities such as CSIRO, Hasting Deering Training Excellence Centre, SIMTARS and BHP Billiton's Integrated Remote Operations Centre. The BHP Remote Operations Centre honed down the field in which I desire to further my studies, through allowing me to see how a mechatronics degree can be utilised in the resource sector keeping workers safe.

On the final day, we attended the annual QMEA Breakfast where we were formally presented with our Ambassador positions. At this event, their were many networking opportunities with guest speakers such as the Queensland Chief Entrepreneur, Mark Sowerby presenting to us. This wonderful experience has broadened my awareness of the sector while aiding in networking with some of QMEA's 12

industry partners. With QMEA being Australia's grandest and exceedingly prosperous industry/education schools partnership and its ideology promoting diversity, I am proud to be a QMEA Ambassador for 2017. So I urge you to look out for any upcoming QMEA days or events!

The QMEA Ambassador Program is for 20 students from around Queensland who are interested in a career related to Science, Technology, Engineering or Maths and who would like to gain an insight into careers in these areas. The camp lasted for three days and



was held in Brisbane. During the camp, we went on many exciting tours of workplaces related to STEM. We toured CSIRO, where they showed things like virtual reality technology, remote controlled drones and walking robots. We then went to SIMTARS, where they study mine safety, and they showed us a virtual tour of the mine with a virtual fire extinguisher, which is used to train people before they enter a mine. We learnt about gas leaks in mines, how they can cause explosions, and how they study these explosions by replicating them. Then we went to Hastings Deerings, a company that designs and improves upon excavators. They showed us how the excavators work, with details on the engine, electronics, hydraulics, and tracks. On the last day, we attended a presentation during breakfast, where we got to have a conversation with many of the people who work in careers related to STEM, and later went on a tour of the BHP building. At the BHP building, the people can control a mine remotely from their computers, where they can communicate with workers on the mine.

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

I write to you as the final hearing involving the Catholic Church at the Royal Commission into Child Sexual Abuse commences on February 6, 2017.

For the victims and survivors, for the Catholic community and for many in the wider Australian community, this hearing may be a difficult and even distressing time, as the Royal Commission reviews the evidence it has already received and seeks to understand why and how this tragedy has occurred.

Deeply mindful of the hurt and pain caused by abuse, I once again offer my apology on behalf of the Catholic Church. I am sorry for the damage that has been done to the lives of victims of sexual abuse. As Pope Francis said recently, 'it is a sin that shames us'.

Over the next three weeks, evidence presented during the Royal Commission hearings will be analysed, statistics about the extent of abuse will be made public, and the way forward will be explored. Many of our bishops and other Catholic leaders will appear before the Royal Commission. They will explain what the Church has been doing to change the old culture that allowed abuse to continue and to put in place new policies, structures and protections to safeguard children.

Pope Francis has urged the whole Church to, 'find the courage needed to take all necessary measures and to protect in every way the lives of our children, so that such crimes may never be repeated'.

Throughout the coming weeks, I want to assure you of my thoughts and prayers. I encourage you to turn in prayer to the one who is always ready to listen: Jesus Christ, who brings healing and hope.
