Every minute matters at Chanel! Unfortunately, too many students have been arriving late to school this term. To assist students in being ready for the school day, arriving on time to school is vital. Our first bell rings at 8.40 am and we expect our students to arrive before this time and be prepared for the school day.

Developing bad punctuality habits has an impact now, while at school, and into the future, when in the workforce. Student tardiness not only disrupts Pastoral Care or a lesson but it also impacts the learning of other students. Students arriving late to school not only miss vital information such as announcements of

academic/sporting/co-curricular activities but they also negatively impact the overall classroom environment. Pastoral Care is designed to build connections with peers. Students who arrive late miss out on this valuable time. It is important that students arrive on time to school or their lesson, prepared to learn and with the correct equipment (including Chromebooks charged).

Several studies have indicated that being absent from school has a negative impact on learning outcomes. As you are all aware, our attendance target for 2019 has been set at 98%. The closest year level to this target is our Year 8 cohort. Well done to our Year 8 students for leading the way with the best attendance data, so far, for Semester 2! Our Year 7, 8, 9 and 11 cohorts are not far behind.

During this term our Year 12 students have been engaging in future planning. Part of this planning Sustice Respect Compassion involves preparation for the Queensland Core Skills Test. On Tuesday 3rd September and Wednesday 4th September, our Year 12 OP eligible and Tertiary Selection Rank students will sit their 2019 QCS

Test. All Year 12 students will be required to attend school on both test days. Students who are not sitting the QCS Test will be involved in their vocational pathways program. This will involve Mock Interviews supporting job applications and an excursion to career pathway opportunities for next year. A letter will be emailed home to parents regarding the test and alternative program arrangements shortly.

This is the last year for the QCS test; however, it is still very important for our current Year 12s in supporting their entrance to university. A student's individual QCS Test result is not used on its own in the calculation of his/her OP - instead, group results are used as part of the statistical scaling processes. A student's individual result on the QCS Test (from A to E) is reported on the student's Senior Statement or Statement of Results. Therefore, it is very important that all of our year 12 OP eligible students work as a team. I am confident that our Year 12s are very supportive of each other during this preparation time. They have been involved in intensive preparation since the start of Term 3.

• This day in history....

known as Richard the Lion Heart ordered the death of 3,000 Muslim prisoners in Akko.

This was only one of many terrible episodes during the Crusades which sought to gain control of the holy city of Jerusalem and secure access to Christian holy places for pilgrims. Richard I has been portrayed as a hero, both in historical literature and in popular culture - the epitime of the chivarous medieval knight. However, his actions on this day in history seem anything but heroic.

Students studying history gain an appreciation of the complex nature of the world in which we live. They can begin to understand that the cultural and religious differences which have their origins in the distant past still impact on relationships between individuals and nations today. Students are encouraged to discover the facts and evaluate the representations of events and individuals which created and handed down to us. Each



generation needs to look for the truth rather than accept the comfortable, romantic stories which are sometimes passed off as 'History'.

### Focus on Curriculum

Subject Selection for Years 11 and 12

It was encouraging to see so many students and parents asking questions about the range of Humanities subjects at the Subject Information Night in Week 5. As students contemplate their course of study they might think about some complementary subjects within the Humanities and Social Sciences Learning Area.

Many students showed interested in studying Legal Studies and may be thinking of going on to study Law at university. If so, other subjects which work well with Legal Studies are Business and Modern History. Business gives insight into the world of commerce and finance which is significant areas for Law. If you have an interest in international relations or politics, Modern History would offer key understandings and a fundamental basis for further study.

Modern History and Geography are certainly subjects to consider if Journalism is on your horizon. An understanding of world events and ideologies is important in informed writing about issues of social and political significance. Social issues related to population growth, natural hazards and the challenge of urbanisation provide salient experiences for budding writers.

Students might consider Geography, paired with Biology, if there is an interest in wildlife science or environmental studies. Geography covers topical issues around climate change, biodiversity and land transformation which impact not only human populations but also fauna and flora.

Parents and students are encouraged to speak to the teachers of these subjects for more specific information.
