Second Hand Uniform Outlet







Year 7 PIT to PORT

About sixty, Year 7 Gladstone Students from different schools attended QMEA "Pit to Port" event held at Gladstone Technical College on 21 March 2019.

All students were divided into 6 groups to work out logistics of getting Australia's Valuable mineral exports from mining pits to port for dispatch to other countries.



Each group was mentored by an industry expert from LNG, Queensland Energy Resources, NRG, Gladstone Ports Corporation, Boyne Smelter and QAL.

The students in these groups then analysed the situation given to them about Fleet management, Product dispatch and Wharf control.

They presented their solution and ideas about moving \$10 billion worth of material annually from mines onto the ships, to all the industry experts and teachers present.

One of the groups was declared the winner. It was a hands on experience for the students preparing them for future skills required in industry.









Year 7 Students go to the Future Leaders Eco Challenge (FLEC)

On Thursday 21 March, eight year 7 students attended the FLEC Excursion held at Canoe Point, Tannum Sands. The students had a fantastic day interacting with people from the Great Barrier Reef Management Park Authority, Gladstone Ports Corporation, Tangarooma, Boyne Island Environmental Education Centre and the Gladstone Regional Council. Some of the activities included 'Protecting our Patch", planting native trees in the sand dunes to

preserve our coast line, marine debris survey and analysis, learning about the Big 6 in the Gladstone Region, performing quadrat analyses and various readings in seawater and lastly learning about the different conservation zones along our coastline. Our College students had a superb experience and were very enthused during the day. Shown below are a few photographs from the day's activities.

Year 7 Excursion to Gladstone Water Purification Plant

Year 7 students visited the Gladstone water purification plant as part of their unit on 'Separation and Filtration Methods'. The students were taken on a tour of the plant and were able to observe firsthand the different filtering methods used in industry. This helped them put what they have studied to context.

During their visit, the students also had the opportunity to visit the laboratory where the actual testing of the samples takes place and they were shown the computerised systems used to monitor the plant.

We are very Grateful to be given this opportunity by the Gladstone Water Purification Plant and would like to thank them for giving their time to show the different stages of water purification to our students.

Out & about

Year 10 History

'The Rockhampton Heritage Village is a museum featuring local historic memorabilia near the Caves township. It was originally the Gangalook Museum but it is now owned and operated by the Rockhampton City Council. On Thursday 14 March, thirty-five year 10 Modern History students visited the Rockhampton Heritage Village to further their knowledge about WWII. When at the village we learnt about and experienced first hand the vehicles used in both World Wars. We also took tours of replica houses from the 1900s and experienced first hand what times were like back in the 1900s. It was great to be given the opportunity to experience first hand what school was like for children in the 1900's and just how much Australia has evolved in the past 50 years. We feel extremely grateful to have these opportunities and are incredibly thankful for the Historical Village and the teachers involved in organising the excursion. We learnt many things and are now well educated about the 1900s in Australia especially the years, 1939-1945 WWII.'

Sustice Respect Compassion Year 9 students were given the opportunity to pitch their ideas for Single Use Plastic Packaging to three representatives from Woolworths. Showing off their

prototypes and explaining how each worked, the students were able to leave the Woolworths Reps with a lot to think about.

Thank you to Woolworths for attending, and providing our students with the chance to change things Globally!

Learning: Students began the term by brainstorming sustainability concerns globally, nationally and locally. Students recognised that the worrying use of single-use packaging within supermarkets, still has huge Implications for the environment. The students recognised through their research that companies such as Woolworths had begun to make changes to products which used SUP, however, they believed much more still needs to be achieved.

Task: Through a Portfolio of Tasks, students identified, investigated and evaluated the ethical and sustainable production and use of Single Use Plastic Packaging. They critically analysed factors including social, ethical and sustainability considerations, that impacted on design solutions for global preferred futures. Students applied design thinking as they constructed a proposal for an innovative solution to Single Use Plastic Packaging use within Woolworths Supermarkets.

Interhouse Cross Country

Term 1 Week 10 - Friday 5 April

This event will be held at Lions Park (behind Coles), with students walking in House groups to the Park for the event. The Interhouse Cross Country is used as the Chanel selection trials to attend the Port Curtis Cross Country trials. Students 13-19 Years of age who finish in the top 10 for their age division will attend Port Curtis trials on Tuesday 30 April at the Gladstone Golf Course. Students in the 10-12 (DOB 2007) need to finish in the top 3-5 in order to attend the Port Curtis trials on Friday 3 May.

Uniform: Students must wear the College Sports shorts with their House Shirt and the College bucket hat.

<u>Competitive runners:</u> are welcome to wear a different hat, cap or visor, running shorts or tights, singlet and running shoes. However, they must change into these items at 12.20 pm before leaving Chanel and then back into their College sports uniform before afternoon Pastoral Care. If wearing a singlet - the House shirt MUST be worn over top of singlet whilst walking to and from Lions Park

HATS: Students will only be allowed to wear a cap/visor once they get to Lions Park. Bucket hats will be placed in a House tub for students to collect after the race – be sure hats are clearly named

9.00 – 11.00 am Whole College Easter Celebration.

11.00am - 12.00 pm Lunch Break. Food will only be available from the Tuckshop at this Break.

12.00 – 12.10 pm Students go to the toilet, get a drink, fill water bottles, put running shoes on/change shorts, get College hat and

cap. Drinks only will be available from the tuckshop at this time.

12.10pm Students meet their Pastoral Leader in designated House Areas. Hat check conducted, apply sunscreen, then walk

over to Lion's Park under the direction of Pastoral Leader and teachers.

12.40 pm Final Instructions at Lions Park, Warm Up and Marshalling – grassed area at start line

Two minute gap between races. Starting with:

1.00 pm Start: 17 Yrs and 18-19 Yrs Boys and Girls

Start: Under 16 Boys and Girls Start: Under 15 Boys and Girls Start: Under 14 Boys and Girls Start: Under 13 Boys and Girls Start: Under 12 Boys and Girls

The top 10 in each age group get the big points, with cut off times for points occurring after this.

13 – 19 Year age group: the first 10 runners (13-19 Year age groups) will represent Chanel College at the Port Curtis Cross Country on Tuesday 30 April (Week 2 Term 2).

12 Year Old students (DOB 2007): Top 5 runners will represent Chanel College at the Port Curtis Trials on Friday 3 May (Week 2 Term 2).

Students are to remain in the vicinity of the Recorder Tent at Lions Park after they complete the race. Please keep clear of the Finish Line after you have completed the race.

• 2.45pm Presentations of House Champion and Age Champions in LaValla Court

• 3.10pm Afternoon Pastoral Care


Welcome to the Chanel College Instrumental Music Program!

Clay Stories is a significant survey exhibition of contemporary artworks in ceramics that have been created by both highly established and emerging Indigenous artists in remote parts of regional Australia.

The exhibition presents pieces that are both sculptural and vessel-based, with each body of work representative of the artists' connection to Country and as a strong medium for story-telling.

Students were able to see the different cultural connections to the land from where each of the artists live. Students then participated in an activity drawing on their own spirituality and family stories by first drawing a visual representation of their own story and then writing how their piece reflects themselves, beliefs and their life. It was wonderful to see students making their own personal connections.

We also had the opportunity to explore the printmaking included in the 'Brimblebox' exhibition which focuses on the birds from this area.
