Sunday's Gospel Reflection

Luke 2:22-40 - *Jesus is brought to the Temple by Mary and Joseph*

Historical Context – Service in the Temple

The ritual of the redemption of the first-born son originates in Exodus 13:2 where God claimed the first-born sons of Israel as God's own. These sons were to be sanctified for service in the Temple. However, this service was taken away from the first-born sons of every tribe and reserved exclusively for the sons of the tribe of Levi and the descendants of Aaron, the high-priest. It is from this tradition that we encounter the 'Levites' in the gospel accounts. The Levites were involved in various ministries in the Temple: assisting the priests; musicians; and slaughtering sacrifices.

Have you thought? – The role of the observer

In today's gospel passage, it is the devout Simeon and the prophetess, Anna, who declare the greatness and far-reaching influence of the child that has been brought to the Temple. This is a common feature of the gospel accounts. It is not Jesus himself who proclaims his greatness but those who have observed him and recognised the revelation of God's presence amongst the people. It is a role that continues today. Those of us who believe and recognise the presence and influence of God in the world are challenged to proclaim it in both our actions and our words.

Gospel Focus – A sword

Simeon's second pronouncement about Jesus is addressed to the child's mother, Mary. Having predicted the rejection that Jesus will endure, Simeon tells Mary, 'and a sword will pierce your own soul too.' He appears to be referring to the sacrifice that Mary will have to make in the future. On this day, Mary and Joseph have 'redeemed' their son from service to the Lord in the Temple. Despite this, Jesus is still destined for service to God and Mary will have to surrender him back to the Lord. Simeon suggests that Mary herself will be a sacrifice offered to God at this time.



Loving God, your Son, Jesus came into this world, living under the demands of the Law and of life in a human family. Within that life, he brought the light of your salvation. Give me the wisdom of your Spirit to know that your light continues to shine, even in the difficulties and challenges of my own life

Amen.

ACROSS THE Curriculum



Welcome back! | As the new school year begins, teachers are planning and preparing our educational programs, in which the teaching of reading plays a vital part across all learning areas and across all year levels. Every subject we teach requires our students to engage with written text- so the teaching of reading and monitoring progress is a high priority of all staff at our school.

Why is reading to our children and our students so important?

Evidence suggests that children who read for enjoyment every day not only perform better in reading tests than those who don't, but also develop a broader vocabulary, increased general knowledge and a better understanding of other cultures. Reading for pleasure is linked to greater success at school.

What difference can I make as a parent?

You can make a huge difference! Parents are the most important educators in a child's life – even more important than their teachers – and it's never too early, or too late, to start reading together. Learning to read is about listening and understanding as well as working out what's printed on the page. Through hearing stories, children are exposed to a wide range of words. This helps them build their own vocabulary and improve their understanding when they listen, which is vital as they start to read. It's important for them to understand how stories work too.

As children start to learn to read at school, you can play an important role in helping to keep them interested in books. Find out what interests them, help them to find books that will be engaging and fun, and spend time reading the books they bring home from school together.

What if my child is struggling with reading?

This year, working in close collaboration together, our curriculum and learning support teams are implementing MiniLit. If, after all the great work that our teachers do in their classroom situation, children are still finding reading difficult, then an alternative approach is implemented.

What is MiniLit?

MiniLit is a special teaching program designed for young children in Years 1 and 2 who are struggling to learn to read. The program is usually offered in small groups of up to four children to help them to catch up with their classmates. A note will be sent home with the students who are about to participate in this reading program.

Why has my child been selected to do MiniLit?

Your child's classroom teacher will be able to give you more specific information about why your child has been chosen to receive MiniLit instruction but basically it is because your child is not making as much progress as the other children in his or her class, and are falling behind. The aim of the MiniLit program is to help young struggling readers to catch up quickly.

What is involved in the MiniLit program?

Teachers work with small groups for up to an hour a day for four days a week using the carefully structured MiniLit program materials. The program takes about two terms to complete. Each lesson has three main components:

Sounds and words activities: where children learn to pay attention to the different sounds in words and to associate them with the letters of the alphabet

Text Reading: which gives children the chance to practice their new skills

Story book reading: which involves the teacher reading and discussing a story book with the students, to help improve their vocabulary and comprehension

How Can I support my child with learning to read? (Sourced from the MiniLit Parent Fact Sheet)

You can support your child in learning to read by reading to your child for up to half an hour every day using a story book. Here are some helpful hints.

1. Set the scene

Before you read the story, tell your child the title of the book and a bit about it. Try to relate it to your child's own experience, if you can. If it is about dogs, talk about a dog they know. You can also discuss what might happen in the story.

2. Read the book

Read the story in a lively way with lots of expression. If you come across unfamiliar words, stop and tell your child what they mean. This improves your child's vocabulary and helps them to understand the whole story.

During the week, you might also like to remind your child of some of the new words from the story book and relate them to your everyday life.

3. Recalling the story

After reading the book, ask your child questions about the story. For example, "What happened at the beginning of the story?" or "What happened at the end of the story?". If they can't remember, tell them.

You might also want to try asking different types of questions that require more than a yes or no answer. For example, "Why do you think the little green dragon was so sad?" These sorts of questions help to develop your child's language skills. You don't need to read a different book for every session; in fact, rereading the same book several times allows the child to become familiar with the story and helps them to learn new vocabulary.

Finally, being patient and enthusiastic will make reading together a much more positive experience for both you and your child. Have fun!

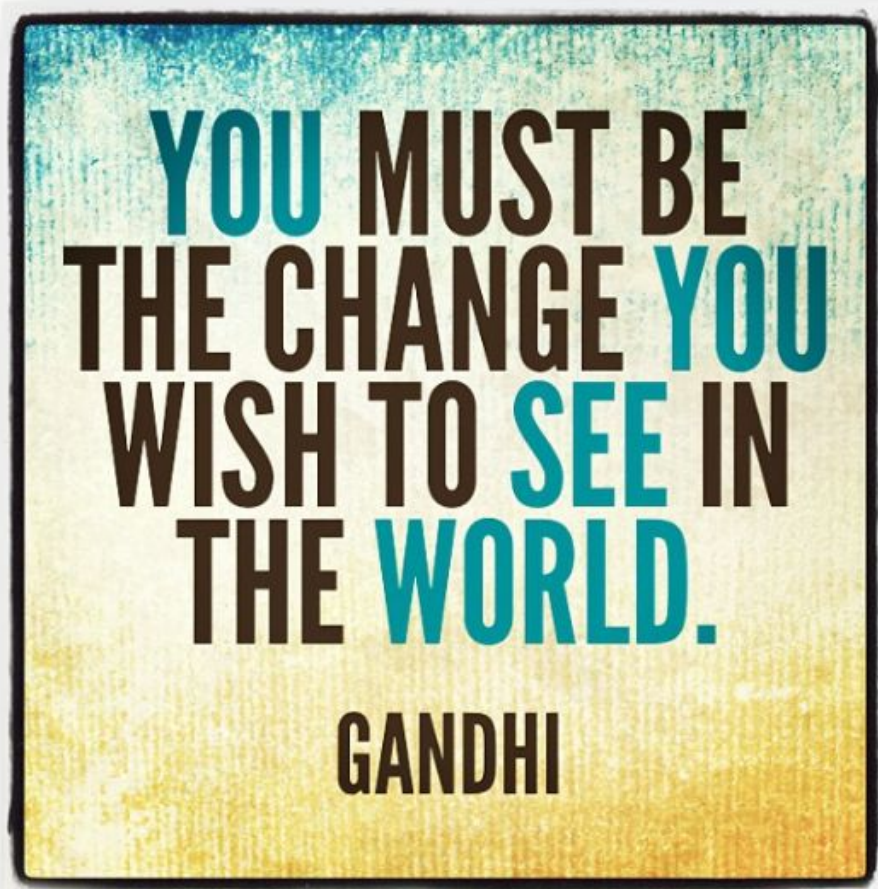

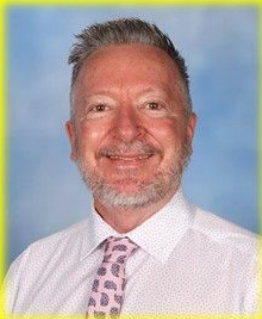
